### SPEAKING FOR SAS

This has been a head-spinning quarter. In March I debated the issues of whether gun laws are repugnant to the Second Amendment (yes, they are) and whether the lack of state militias is repugnant to the Second Amendment (yes; but my definition of militia is composed of all citizens above the age of 16 and not the National Guard under the direction of the President or Governor.) The debate was part of a three-day WeThePeople Conference.

The shooting at Virginia Tech resulted in a plethora of interest in all groups concerned with guns, both pro- and con. I appeared on live-remote for Canadian Television on a Columbine Anniversary program. Radio Netherlands had a four-way discussion on the impact on inter-human relations when guns are present in a society. The moderator was in The Netherlands, I represented the US, there was an ex-sniper in Switzerland and an anti-gun activist in South Africa. We interacted for almost an hour to produce a 14-minute segment.

Recently, SAS has been asked to participate in Second Amendment supportive radio programs in Michigan.

As National Spokeswoman I, literally, have talking points. I use them both in speaking and in writing. These are positions that have been discussed either among the board of directors or among the State Coordinators, and are, therefore, the official stance of SAS.

In addition to my talking points, the three biggest of which I will share, I work hard to maintain a calm, reasonable demeanor. This is easiest when writing or having an off-camera, telephone or ham-radio, interview. It is especially easy when the interviewer is on our side. That is not the usual case.

Oppositional broadcasts are very popular. They make having a strong idea of message especially important, because the speaker for the other side and possibly the

## PRESIDENT'S CORNER

It is my great privilege to be able to state unequivocally that SAS is in great shape! Our membership is growing by leaps and bounds, and we are picking up more state coordinators and area coordinators to help them. We still have openings for coordinators in some states. We continue to hold our "Ladies Learn to Shoot" days across the country. We have trained literally thousands of women in gun safety and how to shoot. Many of these women go on to get the Concealed Carry Permit.

In the past few months, we have had three successful mail-outs to all of our members. We sent letters containing very distinctive SAS post cards and asked that our members send them to their congressional representatives. One was sent out to ask that our representatives vote no on the renewal of the "Assault" Weapons Ban, HR 102. That bill was defeated.

The second mailing was concerning a hideous piece of legislation that will allow the Federal government to add medical history background checks to be able to buy a gun. This was a terrible affront to the sanctity of the doctor-patient relationship, and people's right to privacy.

The history of HR 2640 demonstrates that we must remain ever alert. Although harmful legislation can be opposed and even defeated, it is still bound to reappear in some form. All it takes is a change of number to bring it back to life, and the anti-gun forces are relentless.

The third mailing was a fund raising letter. This was only the second time in the nearly eight years of our existence that we have sent out a fund raising letter. The response was very good, and we want to thank each one of you who sent in a donation. Donations of any amount are always very welcome, and we do our utmost to use the money very wisely and carefully. Even though we are all volunteers, we do have expenses such as postage and printing up stationery, brochures, etc.

We are now gearing up for our second in person meeting of state coordinators in Dallas. These ladies are using their own money to get to this meeting! It is so helpful to get to know people with whom we work on a daily basis in cyberspace.

Once again, thanks to all our members for doing your part to help keep Second Amendment Sisters growing.

# STATE OF THE STATES

## CALIFORNIA

On April 22, the San Diego Area Coordinator, Joanne “Skip” Dishon, organized a ladies shoot at the Project 2000 range in El Cajon. She had 19 ladies sign up for the event, most of whom were 1<sup>st</sup> time shooters! The event was such a complete success that she has already scheduled another one for September. The Project 2000 range was very pleasant and hospitable, kindly providing us our own private range.

On May 20<sup>th</sup> I had the honor of representing the 2<sup>nd</sup> Amendment Sisters to the Jewish War Veterans of the United States. Most of the men in this room were veterans of WWII and the Korean conflict; you can imagine how most of these men feel about the 2<sup>nd</sup> amendment. I was in awe at the amazing history sitting in that room at JWV Post 595. They were quite passionate. The post-discussion about the right to defend ourselves and the need to be making sure our legislators hear us was incredibly refreshing.

While California SAS membership is definitely up, with a 295% increase since January, my next order of business is a membership drive. We will be holding ladies shoots in the Los Angeles and Bakersfield areas.

SAS will be having a table at the World Steel Challenge Championships which are being held in Piru, CA on August 16<sup>th</sup>-19<sup>th</sup>.

### On the Legislative frontline:

**AB 1471** - This bill would require all semi automatic pistols to have a “microstamping” firing pin. That way each time the gun was fired it would put the firearm make, model, and serial number on the casing. The idea is of course criminal identification.

**AB 334** - This bill would require that anyone who has a firearm stolen needs to report the theft within 5 days of it being stolen. Persons who do not report their firearm stolen within the required amount of time would be fined.

**AB 652** - This bill would prohibit an employer from discharging an employee or refusing to hire an applicant on the basis that the employee or applicant legally stores a firearm in his or her vehicle at the work site.

**AB 1645** - Forbids the governor from seizing or confiscating guns or ammunition, during a state of war or a state of emergency, from any person lawfully carrying or possessing the gun or ammunition, provided, however, that a peace officer acting in his or her official capacity may disarm an individual if the officer believes it necessary for public safety purposes.

## MAINE

I will start with the nice news, give you the cold facts, but don't fall asleep before you read the last few paragraphs. All is not well.

Two Introduction to Shooting for Women will be presented at the South Berwick Rod and Gun Association. Again, these are generously sponsored by the Kittery Trading Post. Although the applications were supposed to be capped at 20, to date there are 23 applicants and a growing waiting list. KTP has been handling the sign-up process, and informed me that this is the most popular seminar they hold. Both events will include a lobster lunch, and cost \$25. The fee did not seem to impact interest. They are the only fundraisers scheduled.

There were far fewer bills affecting gun use and ownership during this legislative session.

Happily, **LD361** and **LD1111** did not pass. The latter was a bill brought by a group of middle school children. During the hearings, it was brought out that the only source they used for their contentions was the Brady web site. The children were told that there was more to research than looking at one side of a controversial issue. The teacher was neither reprimanded nor fired.

While most of the bills concern hunting, it is important that there is an effort being made to encourage young people to enter the shooting sports. Unfortunately, **LD1009** did not pass. It would have required an inclusion of firearms instruction in the curricula of high schools.

I have contacted several state legislators about the possibility of sponsoring a bill erecting 'Safety Zones' instead of gun-free zones.

A situation has just come to my attention that may have a severe impact on all of us. A young woman who attended our first Intro to Shooting class has had all her weapons confiscated. She became very interested in shooting, came to practice sessions with her husband, began buying guns, took up reloading. She was enthralled. It was a hobby she shared with her husband.

At some point her husband was convicted of domestic abuse, and was placed on probation. Although this was after their marriage, it did not involve the woman in question. After the probation was over, the couple brought back the guns they had stored at a family member's home. The woman bought another gun. In December the county sheriff arrived at the home, told them the husband was banned from having guns for life, not the period of probation, and confiscated all guns in the home, plus the ammunition that they had reloaded. He allowed them to keep the reloading equipment for the time necessary to sell it.

There were five guns taken - a rifle, which belonged to the husband, a shotgun and three handguns that belonged to the woman. Included in the three was her original gun, a .25 caliber pistol she inherited from her uncle. There was a delay in her written request to regain the firearms, and she was told it was 'too late; they are gone.'

**WANTED** ~ Pro-Second Amendment lawyers in all states who will counsel people in this kind of position. The implication of gun confiscation from a woman who has done nothing because she is married to a man who is convicted of domestic abuse is chilling. How could one defend oneself if she were the victim?

### MICHIGAN

Here's what's going on in the Michigan Legislature.

#### **2007 House Bill 4168 (Increase shooting from vehicle penalties )**

Introduced by Rep. Brenda Clack on January 30, 2007, to provide sentencing guidelines for the increased penalties proposed by House Bill 4167 for intentionally shooting a firearm from a vehicle or into a building in a manner that endangers another person. ·Passed in the House (109 to 1) on March 15, 2007. ·Received in the Senate on March 20, 2007.

#### **2007 House Bill 4167 (Increase shooting from vehicle penalties)**

Introduced by Rep. Brenda Clack on January 30, 2007, to increase the penalty for intentionally shooting a firearm from a vehicle in a manner that endangers another person, or shooting at a potentially occupied building, from up to four years in prison and a \$2,000 fine, to 10 years and \$10,000, 15 year and \$15,000 if another person is seriously injured, and up to life in prison if someone is killed. ·Passed in the House (109 to 1) on March 15, 2007. ·Received in the Senate on March 20, 2007.

#### **2007 House Bill 4612 (Establish retired law enforcement officer pistol certificate)**

Introduced by Rep. John Espinoza on April 19, 2007, to establish sentencing guidelines for the crime included in House Bill 4611 of providing false information on an application for a certificate to carry firearms by a retired law enforcement officer.

### **2007 House Bill 4554 (Allow smokeless powder rifle for hunting where black powder allowed)**

Introduced by Rep. Brian Calley on March 29, 2007, to allow the use of a smokeless powder rifle for hunting in the same circumstances in which black powder rifles are allowed. Under current law there are expanded seasons for muzzleloading rifles, which use black powder or modern substitutes (other than "smokeless powder," which is only used in modern cartridge firearms).

### **2007 Senate Resolution 19 (THIS IS A GOOD ONE!!!)**

Introduced by Sen. Alan Sanborn on March 7, 2007, to memorialize the Congress of the United States to enact legislation, such as H.R. 226, to provide reciprocity among the states with regard to the right to carry concealed firearms.

### **2007 Senate Bill 118 (Impose penalty for loaded firearm within minor's reach )**

Introduced by Sen. Martha G. Scott on January 30, 2007, to establish sentencing guidelines for the crime proposed by Senate Bill 119 of leaving a loaded firearm within reach or access of a minor child.

### **2007 Senate Bill 119 (Impose penalty for loaded firearm within minor's reach )**

Introduced by Sen. Martha G. Scott on January 30, 2007, to prohibit storing or leaving a loaded firearm within reach or access of a minor under certain circumstances.

## **NEW HAMPSHIRE**

New Hampshire has a lot to be proud of this legislative season. SAS-NH members were instrumental in defeating SB44 a bill that would have changed New Hampshire from a shall-issue to a may-issue state.

SAS-NH members also came out in full force to support HB685, a bill to keep NH out of the Real ID Act of 2005. Our piece of legislation, introduced by Representative Neil Kurk, not only stops our state from participating but also creates a law that protects NH citizens from any future federal legislation aimed at creating a national ID card.

Annie Leger, who leads the Monadnock region for SAS-NH, has many plans in the works. We are glad to have her aboard and are looking forward to seeing the fruit of her labor.

Thanks to Nancy Crowley, our Manchester Coordinator, we are now holding monthly ladies practices at the Manchester Firing Line. These practices are at 6pm on the second Sunday of each month.

We want to extend a special thanks to member Richard Aldrich who donated 100 targets for use at our ladies' practices. Half of the targets are 'bad guy' targets meant to aid in the practice of women who actively carry. The other half are silhouettes.

Upcoming events include the New Hampshire Taxpayers' Coalition Picnic on July 7, and our quarterly meeting on July 28. We will also participate in the Free State Project's annual gathering at Gunstock during the third week of July.

## **OHIO**

I had the opportunity to speak to a CHL gun class where a lot of Ohio ladies were in training. I am happy to say that I have been invited back.

Things are in motion to get a Ladies' Shoot going in Cleveland. We have the support of Atlantic Gun and Tackle, who have expressed interest in helping us with our cause.

I am in the process of contacting members whose memberships have lapsed.

Concealed handgun license (CHL) statistics for the first quarter of 2007(OHIO):

There have been 92,121 regular, and 217 temporary emergency licenses (TEL's) issued by Ohio's 88 sheriffs since Ohio began issuing the licenses in 2004. Less than 1% of those have been suspended or revoked for any reason.

After the first year rush to obtain licenses, demand has stabilized as Ohio moves into its fourth year of issuing licenses. From January through March of this year, 5,356 more people obtained their CHL's, and 9 people obtained TEL's. This represents only a 3% decline from the same quarter in 2006. As happened last year in the first quarter, it is also an increase above the third and fourth quarters of the previous year.

The passing of **HB347** last December may have helped generate interest in new licenses, as many people did not want to (or understand how to) comply with the "plain sight" restrictions that existed previously. That law did not take effect until March 14 and thus may only have contributed minimally to the strong numbers.

This year Ohio will issue the 100,000th CHL, and with each new license comes increased political power. Just as in all the 44 states that preceded Ohio with concealed carry, the numbers are proving that the law works. The gun ban extremists' claims continue to be proven false, and lawmakers are increasingly interested in real solutions to real problems relating to crime and safety.

### PENNSYLVANIA

After a rally in the Capital Rotunda in Harrisburg of almost

1000 gun owners from around the State of Pennsylvania on April 24th, **HB760**, one of the most restrictive pieces of gun legislation ever introduced in Pennsylvania, seems to be



DOA. Second Amendment Sisters was a supporting organization at the rally. Several members attended. Thanks to everyone. We appreciated Larry Pratt, from Gun Owners of America, attendance in support of Pennsylvania gun owners.

I had the opportunity to be in Philadelphia for a couple of days and visited some gun club Presidents and one club. I will be making another trip after the primary election.

Thanks to Lifetime members William Law and Tom Sawyer for their extra support for our mailing against the McCarthy Bill.

We must continue to be attentive to what a few anti-gun legislators in Harrisburg are doing to further restrict our gun rights.

Against state law, in Philadelphia the City Council passed five restrictive gun laws. Let's see what Harrisburg is going to do with this.

Last year **HB 2563** Carry firearms while hunting was passed and put into law. We still have the Castle Doctrine, Right-to-Carry in State parks, elimination of the PA Instant check system, and others pending in Harrisburg.

Sadly we lost Representative Theresa Forcier, a Sister and a great supporter of our gun rights, in the past election.

CCW Reciprocity Update – Thanks to PA Attorney General Tom Corbett, PA has entered into License to Carry Firearms Reciprocity agreements with South Dakota, Tennessee, Oklahoma and Virginia. Currently PA CCW holder have the right-to-carry in the following states: Alaska, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Michigan, Missouri, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia, Wyoming, Idaho, Indiana, Montana, and Utah. Any adult, from any state, who can legally own a handgun may legally carry it concealed anywhere in Vermont without a permit or permission from government.

We continue to rebuild our membership. I do wish that more members would submit their emails if they have one. It is really an inexpensive way to keep in touch.

**WANTED:** Coords who wish to become more involved and will be responsible for their area of our big state. Contact Judy, the SAS PA Coordinator. The Second Amendment is the Keystone Amendment to our Constitution and Pennsylvania is the Keystone State. Let's make a difference.

host, as well, will be on the attack. The audience is hoping for a cat fight. My number one job is to make SAS look superior. I struggle to keep from being side-tracked, and, if possible, to make my opponent agree with me. So, I keep my talking points handy.

First, self-protection is a matter of Choice. I always capitalize Choice, both writing and speaking. (You know the intonation to use to verbally italicize.) Many women believe in Choice. They feel a woman should make decisions on what to do with her body. I agree. I Choose to protect mine. I do not insist on any other woman making the same decision to protect herself, but I hope that all women will allow me to keep the right to defend myself.

Second, self-defense is a basic human right. We have the right to life; we have the right to protect that life; and we have the right to the means to do so. The United States of America might be the only place, and at most is among a handful of countries, where this is still believed. The United Nations is working to eliminate self-defense as a legitimate reason for killing another.

The reason goes that there is, indeed, a right to life. We all have a right to life. In America we still hold to the ancient Judeo-Christian concept that if you do certain things, you are relinquishing your natural rights. If you attempt to murder someone, you are giving up your own right to live. Your intended victim is free to kill you, instead, and he will be exonerated. He has acted in 'self-defense.'

The New Think is that there are no consequences to decisions. Everyone has the right to life. If someone attacks you with the intent of murdering you, you may do everything in your power to protect yourself except kill him. You have no right to take away his right to life. His attempt to murder does not negate his right to life.

If killing an attacker is the only way to defend yourself, you may kill him and stay alive. However, his murderous attack will not justify your subsequent action, and you will not be able to plead 'self-defense' because it is no longer a defense in most of the world. Kafka, anyone?

Presently, it is a reasonable defense, here. Second Amendment Sisters is a single-issue organization: preserving the legitimacy of self-defense is that cause!

Third, we need to establish Safety Zones to replace the ineffective 'gun-free zones' which do nothing to prevent and much to encourage carnage. We can do this by creating legislation in the states allowing faculty, staff, visiting parents and students who hold concealed carry permits to bring their handguns to schools and other public

places. Concealed weapons extend the protection to everyone, because a person with evil intent entering a school, or mall, or public building would not be able to tell who among the crowd was unarmed.

This same argument works against the claim of 'too many illegal guns' in the country's cities. There may be too many 'illegal' guns, but a worse problem is that there are not enough 'legal' guns on our streets. Evil doers are not keen to engage armed citizens. They prefer defenseless victims.

We will not be defenseless victims, willingly. From our inception Second Amendment Sisters has fought to maintain the dignity of womanhood. We refuse to cower and beg for mercy. Self-defense is a basic human right. We defend that right that we might defend ourselves.
